

#### Post-Baccalaureate Conservation Internship Applications Opening in September

Getty Post-Baccalaureate Conservation Internships aim to diversify the conservation field by increasing the number of students from underrepresented backgrounds enrolled in graduate degree programs related to museum conservation.



These internships are the first nationwide effort to provide yearlong financial support and hands-on conservation experience to underrepresented post-baccalaureates who are preparing to apply to conservation graduate programs.

#### **PROJECT UPDATES**

#### Landmark Status Granted to Six Buildings Representing Black Heritage in Los Angeles

A barber shop, a historic LGBTQ+ disco club, and the home of Los Angeles' first Black mayor are among six buildings that have received Historic-Cultural Monument (HCM) status as part of a project led by Getty and the City of Los Angeles' Office of Historic Resources.

The designations are the result of the ongoing work of African American Historic Places, Los Angeles (AAHPLA), launched by the City and Conservation Institute in 2022 to identify, protect, and celebrate the city's Black heritage. Each site represents a unique piece of Los Angeles' Black history.

Designated sites include St. Elmo Village, the Tom and Ethel Bradley Residence, Jewel's Catch One, StylesVille Barbershop and Beauty Salon, the California Eagle Offices, and New Bethel Baptist Church.

#### **Modern Heritage Course Concludes**

In July, the Conserving Modern Architecture Initiative concluded the second iteration of the International Course on the Conservation of Modern Heritage (MAC), consisting of three months of online learning and two weeks in Los Angeles.

The course aims to advance conservation of modern heritage and architecture by providing participants with methodological and practical tools. It brought together 26 midcareer professionals from 21 countries to deepen their understanding of the conservation of twentieth-century sites.

The two weeks in Los Angeles were a whirlwind of activities, in and out of the classroom that included lectures by local experts, discussions, and exercises; site visits to significant modern sites all around Southern California with tours focused on their conservation; and a hands-on concrete conservation workshop—all with the aim of continuing to provide participants with methodological and technical skills for modern heritage conservation in their own work and regions.



#### **Conservation of Granite in Cultural Heritage**

The field of stone conservation has long needed a holistic perspective that embraces the needs of conservation professionals and provides scientific support to enable them to better analyze preservation issues and implement efficient, long-lasting treatments. This book offers such a perspective by bridging scholarly research on the available literature related to granite decay and best practices from conservators working in the field and laboratory.

First offering an overview of granitic rocks and their natural weathering, this volume then outlines the issues that arise when removing granite from quarries and incorporating it into what eventually becomes built heritage. Case studies are presented alongside guidelines for assessing conservation problems. This book will serve as a fundamental manual for students, conservation scientists, conservators, and restorers alike.



#### Guidelines for Conservation and Management of Gansu Province Grotto Sites

Recognizing the need and opportunity to provide guidance to managers of these sites, the Dunhuang Academy and Getty Conservation Institute, as part of their three-decades-long collaboration, developed this set of practical guidelines aimed at promoting and enhancing the grotto sites' conservation, research, utilization, and management.

## Finding Aid for the Valley of the Queens Project Records

Records for the Valley of the Queens Project date from the 1990s to 2017 and consist of files from our collaboration with the Egyptian Antiquities Organization, renamed the Supreme Council of Antiquities in 1994. The project aimed to undertake comprehensive conservation and site management planning for the Valley of the Queens.



Records consist of electronic and paper files, research documents, correspondence, video and image files, logs, reports, publications, and drawings. The records document project activities such as planning, condition assessments, scientific analyses, conservation treatments, environmental monitoring, graphic documentation, site protection planning, and conservation training.

#### **New in the Conservation Collection**

New to the Conservation Collection are books about conservation history (focusing on prints and drawings), Japanese lacquer, modern architecture, bronzes from Cambodia, geoarchaeology, archaeological philosophy, and the dispersal of Chinese heritage in the early twentieth century.

#### **Conserving Art's Sensory Experiences**

How do we conserve sensory experiences?

In spaces where touch, sound, and movement are central to the experience, preserving an object's physical form isn't always the top priority. Instead, the focus shifts to maintaining how the work engages the senses—how it feels, sounds, and interacts with the viewer.

Unraveling how we perceive multisensory artworks—like those at *Wired for Wonder: A Multisensory Maze*, a collaboration between the Getty Conservation Institute and Kidspace Children's Museum—can help create more nuanced conservation strategies.

#### **Forever Fashion**

Plastics are everywhere—including in museum collections—but they can be unstable and difficult to preserve. For over a decade, the Conservation Institute's Preservation of Plastics project—currently led by conservator Anna Laganà—has tackled these challenges.

Laganà and her team have developed techniques to restore PMMA (Plexiglas), helping preserve items like Lucite handbags and costume jewelry.

Recently, Laganà and biologist Joy Mazurek joined InBloom, a global effort to conserve TPU-coated fabrics affected by "blooming"—a degradation that causes white crystalline deposits and alters an object's appearance and integrity.
