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Dear Colleagues,

I hope this message finds you well. I am pleased to invite abstracts for chapter contributions to the edited volume *The Elgar Companion to Just Urbanism: Deconstructing Policies, Plans, and Practices*.

This volume examines urban justice as a material and contested outcome of the decisions that organise, govern, and transform urban space. It focuses on the concrete carriers of justice in urban life, including planning policy, zoning, land use, housing, infrastructure, real estate, and the allocation of public land. Rather than treating justice as a rhetorical aspiration, the volume explores how resources, opportunities, protections, and burdens are distributed across neighbourhoods and social groups through actual policies, plans, and practices. Adopting an interdisciplinary perspective, the volume brings the Global North and the Global South into dialogue and welcomes contributions on a wide range of themes, including land-use planning, zoning and development control, housing, infrastructure and service provision, real estate, transportation, redevelopment, informality, displacement, segregation, sustainability transitions, climate adaptation, climate justice, digital governance, AI-enabled planning, surveillance, participation, and rights-based urban action. Contributions addressing the lived realities of minorities, racialised groups, marginalised communities, Indigenous peoples, and gendered urban experiences are especially welcome.

The collection will comprise approximately 40 chapters, each of approximately 5,000–7,000 words.

Key dates

Abstract submission (about 300 words) deadline: 30 April 2026

Notification of acceptance: 30 May 2026

Full chapter submission: 30 September 2026

Authors of accepted chapters will also be encouraged to present their contributions at an international workshop dedicated to the themes explored in the volume. I warmly welcome submissions that engage creatively and rigorously with the many dimensions of just urbanism in contemporary cities.
