Documenting Spiral Jetty

In May 2009, the GCI and Dia Art Foundation undertook documentation of Robert Smithson's monumental earthwork, *Spiral Jetty*, using aerial balloon photography. This technique is a relatively simple, low-tech, and inexpensive tool for generating aerial photographs for site monitoring.
