#### **Tim Whalen to Retire as Director**

After thoughtful consideration, Tim Whalen has decided to retire from the directorship of the Getty Conservation Institute. He will remain director of the GCI until his successor is in place.

Tim is proud to have led for more than 25 years, the GCI's talented staff whose expertise, innovation, and unflagging dedication have made the GCI a global leader in heritage conservation, contributing to humanity's collective goal of protecting and preserving the world's cultural heritage. He expresses his gratitude to the professionals around the world with whom it has been his pleasure to work alongside during his tenure and to the wonderful colleagues who came before him.

The international search to identify the next John E. and Louise Bryson Director of the GCI will be launched in early 2026 to assure the



continued excellence and impact of the GCI's work.

Alongside his directorship, Tim has taken on an additional role at Getty, as Vice President of Institutional Planning, in which he will guide development of Gettywide projects that advance and improve the experience of both visitors and staff at the Getty Center. He will continue in this role after he departs the Conservation Institute.

## SR2A 2025 | Synchrotron Radiation and Neutrons in Art and Archaeology International Conference


Earlier this month, we hosted the 2025 Synchrotron Radiation and Neutrons in Art and Archaeology conference at the Getty Center in collaboration with the Stanford Synchrotron Radiation Lightsource.

The event featured discussions on technical advancements and innovative applications of synchrotron and neutron techniques in cultural heritage research, covering topics from instrumentation and analytical methods to case studies that demonstrate how these tools are transforming conservation science.

The week kicked off with the inaugural SR2A Emerging Professionals Seminar, where early-career researchers shared their work through lightning talks and speed mentoring.

Participants also toured our newly renovated science labs and Getty's conservation studios, followed by site visits to UCLA, LACMA, and the Academy Museum.

We hosted a post-conference workshop on the principles of XRF microanalysis, led by Sam Webb from Stanford. The session featured hands-on examples using the MicroAnalysis Toolkit.



## Cleaning of Gilded Wood Workshop 2025: Brazil

In August, the Conservation Institute, in collaboration with the Universidade Federal de Minas Gerais (UFMG), presented our fiveday Cleaning of Gilded Wood Workshop, offered for the first time in Brazil.

The workshop welcomed 24 professionals from across Latin America, Portugal and Macau, who explored cleaning systems developed for water-sensitive gilded surfaces. Starting in the conservation labs of the university, participants learned to prepare and use a range of cleaning formulations, such as flexible polysaccharide gels and PVOH-borax gels.

They also gained practice in the assessment of surfaces' nature and condition, on-site, at the 18th-century Igreja Matriz de Nossa Senhora da Conceição in Catas Altas, Minas Gerais. The final day focused on advocacy and community engagement, with meaningful dialogue between conservators, local stakeholders, and organizations working to preserve the church's historic interiors.

## **Seismic Retrofitting Project**

As part of the Conservation Institute's Seismic Retrofitting Project in Peru, we recently partnered with nine conservators from the Dirección Desconcentrada de Cultura de Cusco (Ministerio de Cultura Cusco) and the Arzobispado del Cusco to conduct earthen grouting tests at the historic Church of Rondocan.



These tests aim to preserve in situ the church's remarkable 17th-century mural paintings using injectable earth-based mixtures. This technique addresses localized detachment without removing the artwork, ensuring the murals remain in their original architectural and cultural context.

## Risk Assessment and Preventive Conservation Workshop in Gdańsk

Conservators, curators, heritage scientists, and students gathered for a two-day workshop, hosted in collaboration with the National Museum in Gdańsk and the Jerzy Haber Institute of Catalysis and Surface Chemistry, Polish Academy of Sciences, on risk assessment and preventive conservation, centered on Hans Memling's renowned triptych *The Last Judgement* at the National Museum in Gdańsk, Poland.

Participants took part in lectures, objectbased demos including DSPI and Hirox 3D microscopy, and hands-on exercises. Group discussions during a wrap-up session highlighted priorities for future risk management and collaborative planning for the triptych's long-term preservation.

## **MEGA-Jordan to Migrate to Arches**



## Mechanical Insights Symposium Session Recordings Now Available

Hosted in November 2024 at the Getty Center, the Conservation Institute's Mechanical Insights: Shaping the Future of Museum Collection Preservation Symposium brought together an international group of experts in the mechanical characterization and preservation of museum collections.



Talks and presentations covered laboratory testing of historical and mock-up samples, risk analysis of objects under external loads and unstable climates, and validation of predictive models. They also highlighted emerging technologies for mechanical testing and analysis of cultural heritage materials, data-based tools for predicting physical changes in art objects, and knowledge-based strategies for environmental management.

# Historic-Cultural Monuments Plaque Unveiling

In August, Los Angeles's 10th City Council district hosted plaque revealing ceremonies for three of six recent sites designated as Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monuments. The designations are the result of the ongoing work of the African American Historic Places, Los Angeles project launched by the City of Los Angeles' Office of Historic Resources and Getty in 2022 to identify, protect, and celebrate the city's Black heritage.

The recognized sites included the Tom & Ethel Bradley Residence, the home of Los Angeles' first Black mayor; St. Elmo Village, a vibrant arts collective that has nurtured creativity and community for decades; and Jewel's Catch One, a historic LGBTQ+ disco club.





## Honoring India's Modern Heritage

Earlier this year in Ahmedabad, architects, conservators, and scholars from across the Indian subcontinent gathered under the bold concrete canopy of the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel (SVP) Stadium to explore its design firsthand.

The visit was part of a new course—Modern Architecture Conservation in India—developed by the Getty Conservation Institute in partnership with INTACH's Heritage Academy. Through lectures, hands-on exercises, and site visits to modern landmarks like SVP Stadium, the course delivered specialized knowledge and technical skills that had long been out of reach for regional conservation professionals.



#### What Goes on Inside Getty's Vaults?

Franziska Bunse, a trained paintings conservator specializing in preventive conservation, completed a year-long Getty Graduate Internship at the Getty Conservation Institute. During her tenure, she collaborated with the Getty Research Institute to document historic photographs and evaluate sustainable storage solutions.



"Through this internship I've had the opportunity to delve further into sustainability in conservation and heritage science. It's a topic that is close to my heart, and I want to continue focusing on that wherever I go," she says.
